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Using Our Strengths

Wichita, KS—On June 15, our church participated in a SWOT analysis. SWOT stands for strengths, weakness, opportunities, and threats. It is a method for evaluating an organization and, in our case, our own church.

The discussion was led by Doug Von. Along the way, we were encouraged to see how we could use our strengths to address opportunities and threats our church faces. We found that we cannot over-generalize; that is, it would be a mistake to think we can characterize our church with a single word or a single statement.

Our strengths include: high commitment, small church, good music and preaching, servant groups (page 4), social activism, members live their faith, taking theology seriously, “prayers of the people,” and non-dogmatic teaching with open discussions.

Our weaknesses include: our small size with a skeleton crew, lack of building ownership, minimal programs for children and youth, and an inability to articulate who to attract to our church.

Our opportunities include: freedom from owning a building, appeal to people alienated from traditional or mainstream churches, peace witness in a time of war, and our website.

We perceive the following threats: lack of substantial numerical growth, building uncertainties, burnout, low income area with high crime, and uncertainties about maintaining paid leadership.

The question remains how we will use our strengths to meet opportunities and threats. Further discussion is needed.

Wichita, KS—On June 26, our church hosted Paul Liechty, the co-founder of ADNet (Anabaptist Disabilities Network) based in Goshen Indiana.

Paul spoke about making churches more welcoming to people with disabilities. About 25 people listened to Paul, which led to many comments and questions.

Paul challenged us to consider three areas of welcome.

The first is mobility. This includes the physical characteristics of the building and grounds, which can hinder or support access.

The second is sensory. This includes issues regarding hearing, language (including sign language), and vision.

The third is support. This includes attitudes and choices of the congregation that affect how well we include families and individuals living with physical, emotional, and cognitive challenges. I wish he had spent more time on the third area, but we ran out of time.

I'm thankful for the way many of our members pitched in to make this meeting successful.

Attending the conference reminded me that the Mennonite Church is much larger and more diverse than any of its local churches. MCS has much to gain from our connection with the Western District Conference.

Deny Your Self

The verse of the month is Luke 9:23.

Then he said to them all, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me." (NRSV)

This is considered to be one of the "hard" sayings of Jesus.

Some people believe Jesus is asking the impossible. Jesus wants us to negate our own selves, or to put other people's interests always ahead of our own, or to deny our own needs.

True, sometimes we are to put other people's needs ahead of ours (think a mother and child), but I do not think Jesus wanted us to deny our total be-

ing. That would lead to physical death. I do not think Jesus wanted dead disciples. Jesus must have meant something else.

I think the key is found in the next verse: "Whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will save it" (Lk 9:24).

It's a riddle. To solve the riddle, it is helpful to introduce the notions of "false self" and "true self". Let's read it again in that light: "Whoever wants to save his life (false self), will lose it (true self), but whoever loses his life (false self) for me will save it (true self)."

The false self is the sense of self we con-

struct or think we are based on what we do (profession), what we have (possessions), and what image we project for the public (persona).

The true self is the Self that remains after we recognize we are not what we do, what we have, or what others think of us. If we lost our job, if we lost our possessions, or if we lost our reputation, we would still have a Self.

What is that Self? I believe that Self is "the image of God" or "Christ in you" (Col 1:27). When we follow Christ, we must transcend (deny) our false selves and, in turn, we that discover (affirm) our true Self in God.
